We live in the Exhibition area of Saskatoon so when we quickly leave the city limits heading south towards the Flats, Fred knows where we're going. It was four years ago when we first took Fred to this beautiful area of the Meewasin Valley Trail. I don't know the exact reasons why he took to it so quickly, but I would like to think it has to do with the beautiful trails that carve their way across the wideopen prairie and rolling hills. Or maybe it is the stillness in the air that allows Fred to hear coyotes from miles away. The view of the South Saskatchewan River from the lookout point is one of Fred's favourite spots, especially as the sun is setting, and I know he's not alone in that.

Cranberry Flats, like many other MVA locations, is a place for people to gather and meet through their love and admiration of nature. Jen and I have met so many interesting people as our dogs introduced themselves. We've met people from across the province and from around the world who are astounded by the beauty of the Meewasin Trails. Sometimes, you just never know who will meet when you're on the trails.

One of my favourite Meewasin memories is from last October. It was a gorgeous Fall evening out at Cranberry Flats. The colours were vibrant as the sun slowly set. Fred and I were heading back to the car when we could see what we thought were two very large dogs trotting over a hill towards us. We quickly realized they were not dogs. The women on their backs were the giveaway. Fred stopped in his tracks and set his tail to 11 as these two beautiful horses made their way to us. Being a 35 year-old in 2017, I immediately grabbed my phone and took a video of Fred's horse encounter and then had a great conversation with the women who lived on a nearby farm. You never know what you're going to see on the Meewasin Trails.

I work at Sherbrooke Community Centre here in Saskatoon as a Communications Leader. It's a wonderful long-term care home that really prides itself on creating joy for its residents, and our staff goes above and beyond to bring that sense of joy to our residents. I mention this because joy is how Jennifer and I feel when we are with Fred on the trails. It is not only Cranberry Flats.

The views of the river heading towards downtown Saskatoon from Diefenbaker Park are spectacular. Walking through Rotary Park on a Sunday morning and seeing people do yoga in the park is a great reminder how Meewasin creates community in our city. The smiles on kids' faces as they watch pelicans find their lunch at the Weir is the epitome of joy! The educational and conservation work the MVA performs is vital and should not be overlooked, but sometimes that is forgotten because you're having so much fun enjoying all the MVA has to offer!

Before I started at Sherbooke Community Centre, I was a CBC journalist. I attended the MVA news conference on June 8, 2016 where it was announced the interpretative centre would be closed. I spoke with many people who were upset with funding cuts and feared there was more to come. I was upset as well but it was not my place as a journalist to infuse the story with my personal opinions. Now, I feel very grateful to share our Meewasin story, Fred's Meewasin story, with the community and feel responsible to speak out on the continued cuts by the Provincial Government. The MVA is a jewel not only in Saskatoon but this province. It deserves to be celebrated and properly funded so people from across Saskatchewan and the world can experience the joy that Jen, Fred and I feel every time we set foot on the trails. We hope to see you out at Cranberry Flats soon.

Cameco Meewasin Rink



The Cameco Meewasin Skating Rink *@Nutrien Plaza* opened to the public on December 16, 2017 and ran until March 17, 2018, for a total of 92 days. There were close to 46,000 users this season 19,000 more than last, which meant an average of 500 per day. Last season the rink operated for 91 days with 26,864 users.

On December 19, 2017, the Tim Hortons Twinkle Light Ceremony was the official start to our season. Other major event days hosted were: Nutrien Wintershines on January 28, 2018, and Cameco's Family Day celebration on February 19, 2018. The Tim Hortons Sprinter Van was able to make it to all events serving many cups of hot chocolate and coffee.

Over all this past season was busy as usual. The cold temperatures didn't slow people from coming out to skate, in fact this was our busiest season on record. Many new Canadians and visitors to Saskatoon enjoy skating at our rink. To name a few, they were from: Edmonton, Calgary, Regina, Dallas, Minnesota, California, Mexico, England, Ukraine, Venezuela, Russia, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Sweden, Japan and China. The Meewasin Northeast Swale -Rich in Nature, Rich in History



The Meewasin Northeast Swale is approximately 26 kilometres long and covers 2,800 hectares, starting within the City of Saskatoon and ending north of the Clarkboro Ferry. Besides being rich in biodiversity, and habitat, it has many historical elements as well. The Swale includes a remnant section

of the Moose Woods, Batoche Trails, Middleton's staging camp on the trek to the Battle of Batoche, and numerous tipi rings from the encampments of the original residents of the Saskatoon area. It's the site of the telegraph line that linked North America to Europe by way of Russia, and the site of the now ghost town of Clarkboro. It is a chance to celebrate the magnificent river valley, parks, conservation areas, gardens and urban forests, together with all of the fascinating wild critters and native plants found all around us.

The festival theme for 2018, is "âniskopicikêwin: Things are Linked Together". Our city is a living network of rivers and streets, trees and office towers, prairies and yards. We are a city of contrasts unified by the natural networks that hold our

ecosystem together. NatureCity Festival 2018, uses the Cree concept âniskopicikêwin (pronounced Ansco-p'-tchik-e-win) to describe these vital connections. The Meewasin River Valley acts as a vital connection for Saskatoon by connecting humans to nature within our city, by acting as an ecological corridor for wildlife movement, and by being the main artery connecting the numerous natural areas and parks within our city. Meewasin will play an active role in this year's NatureCity Festival 2018, by hosting numerous events, including interpretive hikes at our conservation sites and along the Meewasin trail. Meewasin Greenhouse



Each spring Meewasin grows over 25,000 plants in their greenhouse and this year is no different. Thirty different species of grasses and herbaceous flowering plants that are native to the Saskatoon region are propagated. Some examples are dotted blazing star, 3-flowered avens, gaillardia, plains rough fescue and blue grama grass to name just a

The seeds for these plants are locally sourced and hand picked by our summer students. Once they are cleaned the seeds are stored in the Meewasin seed bank.

These plants will be used this summer for various reclamation projects, trail edging, healing gardens, etc. So, if you see the MVA horticulture crew working along the trail this growing season there is a good chance they are planting native grasses and herbaceous flowering plants that were grown in the MVA greenhouse.
