Wildlife: As the Saskatchewan River and its tributaries flow from mountains to the ocean they contribute to varied habitats supporting a variety of plants and animals. • The Rocky Mountains are home to mountain goats, bighorn sheep and grizzly bears. • Deer and elk, black bear and wolf, and many bird species make their homes in the forests of the Aspen parklands and rolling plains .• In the Canadian Shield fish dine on insects such as mosquitoes and blackflies. • Among fields and pastures of the **prairies**, deer, fox, coyote, waterfowl, raptors, ground squirrels and songbirds are often camouflaged or concealed from view.

Medicine Hat? Count your steps — every step you take is approximately 100 km. Measure your way across the Prairies. . . or explore your way across, discovering treasures, the routes of the rivers, the old fort trails, the geological formations, the mineral resources, the flora and fauna that make us in the Saskatchewan River Basin unique. In the water spray feature you can find water bodies, cities, forts, borders, animal tracks, footprints, and various embedded shapes. They're listed below with corresponding numbers shown on the map.

> Not all forts are identified on the water play feature. For example Fort La Montee was on the North Saskatchewan River approximately 5 km upstream from Fort Carlton and was dismantled after the North West Company and the Hudson's Bay Company merged.
