In 1979, guided by a visionary 100-year concept plan, the Meewasin Valley Authority was created to steward more than 67 square kilometres of natural habitat along the South Saskatchewan River. The decision to have an independent body conserve and monitor development of a publicly accessible river valley has made Saskatoon the envy of other cities.



Year-round education and tourism programming



Meewasin is the heart of our region, and lives in the hearts of our citizens who stroll, roll, jog, play, cycle, paddle, ski and skate their way through the valley. Families bond on the trails and at natural areas, delighting in the magic of chickadees in their palms, snowflakes on their tongues and the wildlife they discover. Graduations, marriage proposals, weddings and other celebrations and ceremonies happen on the shores of the river and in Meewasin green spaces.










We have 40 years of experience in protecting our valley, enabling access and educating citizens – and the awards and accolades to show for it.

Launching efforts for the next 40 years requires renewed government and community commitment. Our current partner funding from the Government of Saskatchewan, the City of Saskatoon and the University of Saskatchewan does not cover capital costs required to maintain and expand community infrastructure and services. Due to the growth in population around our conservation zone, we increasingly rely on donations, grants and opportunities to generate revenue. We are working with our partners to negotiate how each entity can support us to realize this plan. Meewasin also needs the support of public and corporate sectors to implement our capital projects and thrive as the most effective conservation, development and education organization we can be.

Extend the Trail

Meewasin currently maintains over 90 km of trail, many sections of which are more than 30 years old and at the end of their life cycle. This funding will allow us to create new trail, widen and upgrade existing trails, and connect new neighbourhoods in the downtown, near Kinsmen Park, and from Holiday Park to Gordie Howe Bridge.

Grow the Prairie

Meewasin currently grows and plants an average of 12,000 native shrubs, trees and grasses annually to enhance and restore land within our jurisdiction. With this funding, we will expand our greenhouse and seasonal planting program, create a publicly accessible, year-round greenhouse and native seedbank in cooperation with the USask and City of Saskatoon.
