

## Meewasin Announces the Dedication of the **Diana Sproat Memorial Trail Counter**

November 1, 2021

Dedication of this wonderful memorial will take place on Friday, November 12 at 4:30 PM in River Landing. Applicable COVID restrictions will be followed.

From inscribed stones to plagues on benches and everything in between, Meewasin is pleased to help residents find ways to memorialize their loved ones in the Meewasin Valley. But a couple of years ago, we were challenged by Dean Sproat to find something unique for his late wife.

Diana Sproat passed away on September 2, 2019 after a long battle with brain cancer. A longtime math consultant and teacher, Diana was both a mother and grandmother. She was also an avid runner who spent a significant amount of time on the Meewasin Trail. As such, a state of the art trail counter placed in her memory only made sense.

This new type of trail counter tracks the total number of pedestrians and cyclists, giving numbers for each one as it is able to differentiate between them. Meewasin has a number of these new and interactive trail counters planned for new enhancements throughout the Meewasin Trail that can also be dedicated. These dedications help to support the cost of trail improvements and are an important part of continuing free public access in the Valley.

Andrea Lafond, CEO of Meewasin who had to say about the dedication, "Everyone at Meewasin is proud to help Dean honor his late wife as we are with anyone who comes to us with a memorial idea. We take great pride in being a part of so many people's lives in this city."
