Meewasin is located on Treaty Six Territory and the traditional lands of the nêhiyawak, Anihšināpē, Dakota, Nakoda, Lakota and the homeland of the Métis people. We honour the ancestors of this land and reaffirm our relationship with one another.

The Meewasin Valley Authority is a non-profit organization that exists to ensure a healthy and vibrant river valley, with a balance between human use and conservation, for the benefit of present and future generations, in Saskatoon & area.

Meewasin has been the steward of the river valley corridor since 1979 – a short period of time compared to those that came before us. We humbly acknowledge the Indigenous peoples who are the original caretakers of this land.

The Northeast Swale is an ancient river channel located in the northeast part of Saskatoon that begins at Peturrson's Ravine and carves a 26 km long path adjacent to the South Saskatchewan River. It provides significant ecological services as a diverse, connected network of rare native prairie, riparian areas and wetlands, all existing in an urban landscape.
