


Remembering Raymond Moriyama

The Meewasin team and board were deeply saddened by the passing of renowned Canadian architect Raymond Moriyama. In 1978, Moriyama led a team to explore the natural and cultural resources of the river valley in the Saskatoon region. The completion of this work resulted in the 100-year Meewasin Valley Project, the visionary plan that Meewasin still uses today. This report began with Raymond's statements that "something really exciting could be developed in the Saskatoon area" and that "an unusual community enhancement opportunity exists for this and future generations." Raymond could not have been more right. Today, our region enjoys one of the most publicly accessible riverfront corridors in North America, through the middle of the largest city in Saskatchewan, that supports biodiversity, and a high quality of life for residents and visitors. Moriyama's passion for the organization continued over the next four decades, as he advocated, supported, and shared the story of a prairie city that got it right.

Healthy and Vibrant **Resource Management**

In 2023, Meewasin's resource management team undertook focused initiatives on ecological monitoring, conservation planning, and invasive species management. Leafy Spurge Flea Beetles were released across four Meewasin sites as a biological control method to target the noxious weed Leafy Spurge. Efforts were also made against European Buckthorn, Nodding Thistle, and Baby's Breath with significant contributions by the Friends of the Valley Volunteer Program. Additionally, the team monitored and banded Tree Swallows, expanded bat monitoring initiatives, installed wildlife-friendly fencing, and organized planting projects with school groups and volunteers. We also continued our urban beaver management efforts by protecting riparian tree canopies and educating the public on the importance of beavers in the river valley.

Canadian Prairies Prescribed Fire Exchange



In 2023, the Canadian Prairies Prescribed Fire Exchange (CPPFE) made notable progress in promoting prescribed fire as an ecological management tool. Key achievements included two Training and Exchange (TREX) events: a 5-day live fire training in Saskatoon with 45 participants from 21 agencies, and the Manitoba Tallgrass Prairie & Aspen Parkland TREX, conducted with the Nature Conservancy of Canada, which trained 30 students from 11 agencies. Additional activities included workshops with the Saskatoon Public School Division, volunteer fire departments, and land management groups, as well as guest lectures at educational institutions and presentations at major conferences. Community engagement was further strengthened through events like the Elder's Fire Gathering.

Education in the Meewasin Valley

Meewasin continues to focus on providing curriculum-connected, land-based learning opportunities. In 2023-24, the Education & Experiences Team worked closely with local school divisions to offer outdoor learning at Beaver Creek Conservation Area and the Northeast Swale in all four seasons. The demand for programming remained high, reaching over 2,800 students. Meewasin is grateful to supporters and sponsors of our education programming, including the Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) and the Association of Saskatchewan Urban Parks and Conservation Agencies (ASUPCA).

Expanding Our Tourism Portfolio

Since 2021, Meewasin has been developing and piloting high quality sustainable tourism experiences that showcase the beauty of the Meewasin Valley. In 2023, our tourism portfolio expanded to include seven unique experiences, attracting 675 guests. These offerings range from dark skies adventures at night to breakfast with the birds at Beaver Creek Conservation Area, walking tours, and winter skating experiences in Downtown Saskatoon. These experiences highlight the people and landscapes that make Saskatchewan special, while supporting Meewasin's ongoing conservation and education efforts.

Meewasin Trail Enhancements

Meewasin continues to enhance our trail network to better accommodate user volumes. reduce barriers to access, improve accessibility and safety, update amenities and signage, and enhance interpretive opportunities. In 2023, construction was undertaken in Kiwanis Memorial Park South, from the Broadway Bridge north to the Bessborough Gardens. The project included widening the primary trail, replacing site furniture, adding new signage, creating two new river lookouts, installing a new drinking fountain with water bottle filler and dog watering tray, adjusting irrigation, repairing adjacent sod, and planting shade trees.

Planned construction for 2024 includes the Kiwanis Promenade behind the Bessborough Hotel. Detailed design for the remainder of Kiwanis and the Kinsmen Link is nearly complete and will proceed to tender and construction as funding allows.

This year, we introduced new activities, including BioBlitz events at Beaver Creek and the Northeast Swale, with more planned for the future. We also organized tree wrapping events, garbage clean-ups, tree and shrub plantings, native grass and wildflower plantings, and continued our efforts to remove invasive species such as Baby's Breath, European Buckthorn, Nodding Thistle, and more.

We successfully ran more than 80 programs, allowing volunteers to explore the Meewasin Valley while providing invaluable work and support. Our heartfelt thanks go to the Grandey Family Foundation for their generous funding, which makes it possible for us to offer so many programs and activities.



Public Facilities

Beaver Creek Conservation Area and the Cameco Meewasin Skating Rink @Nutrien Plaza remain popular attractions for residents and visitors. Beaver Creek operated year-round, Wednesday to Sunday, welcoming 23,668 visitors in 2023-24. The site continues to be a hub for Meewasin's public outreach, offering programs like Eco-Adventure Camps, Grazing Demonstrations, guided tours, volunteer events, and tourism experiences. The rink operated from December 20 to March 10, welcoming over 17,000 visitors, with new features this season including a perimeter fence and a customer interface for improved skate and helmet distribution. Meewasin's Sip & Skate returned for the 2024 season with five events, drawing around 80 guests, including a sold-out Valentine's Day event. Tourism Spotlight: Supper with a Shepherd

Grazing Dinners were a highlight of the 2023 tourism season. Hosted with local chefs from Odla, these dinners provided guests with a locally-sourced, three-course meal amidst the stunning autumn surroundings at Beaver Creek Conservation Area. Featuring a guided hike through native prairie with Meewasin's Renny Grilz and a stock dog demonstration with Shepherd Jared Epp, these events raised awareness about the natural landscapes Meewasin strives to protect. Special thanks go to Odla and Stumbletown Distilling for their support, as well as the Saskatchewan Cattlemen's Association and RBC Tech for Nature. These events will return in Autumn 2024.

New Self Guided Hike at **Saskatoon Natural Grasslands**

Visitors to the Saskatoon Natural Grasslands will notice new signage as they explore the area. With support from RBC Tech for Nature, 13 QR codes were placed throughout the site in 2023, connecting visitors to the Meewasin App. This is the second self-quided hike in the Meewasin Valley, with the first installed on the Yellow Trail at Beaver Creek Conservation Area in 2022. The Meewasin App provides a unique opportunity to share interactive content with trail users, and plans are underway to add an additional self-guided hike at Beaver Creek Conservation Area in 2024.

National Urban Park

Meewasin and Parks Canada, with National participation from a regional steering Urban Parks committee, continue to explore the potential designation of a national urban park in the Saskatoon region. Formed in 2022, the committee is made up of representatives from Meewasin. Parks Canada, the Government of Saskatchewan, the City of Saskatoon, the RM of Corman Park, Saskatoon Tribal Council, Métis Nation—Saskatchewan, the University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon North Partnership for Growth, and Wanuskewin Heritage Park.

It is expected that if designated, the park will be governed under a version of the existing Meewasin Valley Authority model. Close collaboration with local partners and stakeholders will shape the park's vision, boundaries, governance, and the role of Parks Canada. Meewasin is anticipated to act as 'Site Manager', coordinating park operations with a new committee of regional stakeholders overseeing the requirements to maintain the park's status. Meewasin's Board will continue to hold legal and governing authority for its jurisdiction and operations, while Parks Canada will have decision-making power over the designation and maintenance, including federal funding.

Potential benefits of national urban park designation for the Saskatoon region include economic benefits through job creation, recreation, and tourism; conservation of nature and enhancement of climate resilience; reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples; connection and inclusion; and increased partnerships. Next steps include developing a business plan for the potential park to understand a cost/benefit analysis of the potential designation.

New and Improved Meewasin Trail Guide

Significant updates have been made to the Meewasin Trail Guide. The new look aligns with the design of the Primary and Secondary Trailhead signs found throughout the Valley. Updates include the addition of the Southwest Trail alignment to the map, a refreshed look for the guidebook itself featuring sites along the trails and throughout the Meewasin Valley, up-to-date washroom facility information, and expanded trail loops covering the 107 km of trail.

Meewasin's Conservation Efforts **Recognized Worldwide**

Meewasin is recognized worldwide for its leadership in conserving the natural resources of the 6,700 hectares of the Meewasin Valley. Thanks to a great team, volunteers, support from tourism experiences, and funding from donations and partners, Meewasin has not only kept pace but advanced in conservation efforts. We are excited to announce Meewasin's inclusion in the Cornerstone Parks program, alongside other members like Stanley Park in Vancouver, High Park in Toronto, and the Darlington Ecological Corridor in Montréal. The Cornerstone Parks program is Canada's only national network dedicated to maximizing the impact and influence of Canada's large urban parks. Park People created the program in recognition of the unique challenges and opportunities faced by organizations working in large urban parks across Canada.

Funding Overview

For the 2023-24 fiscal year, Meewasin's statutory and participating party funding remained relatively steady, but two-thirds of the total funds came from short-term sources. With population growth and increasing restoration and conservation needs, Meewasin relies heavily on donations, grants, and other revenue opportunities. This approach has been particularly beneficial for capital projects and campaigns but is time-consuming and unpredictable. Securing more long-term funding would help Meewasin manage capacity challenges. We continue to strive to maximize and leverage core funding for community projects.



Endowment Funds

The Saskatoon Community Foundation manages Meewasin's endowment funds. As of December 31, 2023, the funds included:

- Meewasin Naturally Fund: \$1,156,114
- Susan Lamb Fund: \$37.645
- Wes Bolstad Fund: \$27.307

These total \$1,221,066 and continue to grow through contributions and planned gifts. Revenue from these funds supports strategic operations and priorities across Meewasin's three mandate areas.

With the dissolution of Partners FOR the Saskatchewan River Basin (PFSRB) in March 2024, a new agency fund was created at the Saskatoon Community Foundation. Proceeds from the PFSRB Fund will support a prairie water conference and Meewasin's educational programming annually. The intent is to promote awareness, stewardship, and sustainable use of the Saskatchewan River Basin ecosystem and heritage.
